Executive Summary

Purpose

This final report presents the findings from an omnibus public opinion survey of Davison area registered voters, conducted between February and April 2010. This was a joint venture commissioned by the City of Davison, Davison Township, and the Davison Community Schools. Although included as part of the school district sample, Richfield Township declined to participate in this project (but did facilitate access to its voter rolls).

The various sections of the survey instrument (see Appendix B) correspond to the several goals for this project:

- Section 1 asks residents to assess the general **quality of life** in the area, specific public services, and city/township government across several dimensions.
- Initiated in the wake of the recent financial crisis and ongoing recession, Section 2 seeks voter input on possible **budget reductions or service consolidations**.
- Section 3 explores various **mechanisms for communicating** with local residents.
- Section 4 asks respondents to rate the quality of the **DCS** operation and explores prospects for upcoming millage renewals.
- Similarly, renewal of the **Davison Township police millage** is the subject of Section 5.
- Section 6 seeks to elicit perspectives on future **development of the downtown corridor**.

Note that results from the "Comments?" section of the survey appear as Appendix A.

Methodology

The instrument employed here was developed during the Fall of 2009 through joint consultation. The principals were Mr. Dale Martin (City manager, Davison), Mr. R. Clay Perkins (DCS Superintendent), and Mr. Randy Stewart (Planning/Building Administrator, Davison Township); Pat Piskulich (PARL Director) facilitated.

Given a population estimate of 33,500, a sample of 380 persons is required to achieve a 95% level of confidence and a $\pm 5\%$ margin of error. Re nonresponse, our practice is to oversample by a factor of 2-2.5 and augment that number by 10-15% for bad addresses. We settled on a round 1000 for our total sample. We then stratified proportionately by political unit: City of Davison (19%), Davison Township (58%), Richfield Township (23%).

Mr. Martin generated the random samples for his city and for Richfield Township. Mr. Stewart did the same for Davison Township. A PARL associate created three sets of mailing labels, one for each wave of our survey, i.e., an initial mailing and two follow-ups. A new/clean questionnaire was included in each mailing.

Students in an MPA (Master of Public Administration) class at OU assumed responsibility for the project from there, coding, cleaning, and analyzing the data as surveys were returned.

Response diagnostics and respondent demographics follow this Introduction.

Key Findings

1. 95% of residents are very/satisfied with the Davison area as a place to live. They rate public services as good or excellent in large numbers as well; the schools are a particular point of pride. Roads, on the other hand, are the source of greatest dissatisfaction.
2. If cuts must be made, respondents recommend that budget reductions occur in the areas of parks, trails, & recreation, community & economic development, and building inspection & code enforcement. Strong majorities are in favor of studying consolidation for all areas except schools and police protection.
3. 43% of respondents say they favor renewing the school millages set to expire in the next two years. That 38% report themselves to be uncertain means that DCS has some work to do with the voters.
4. Support is stronger for renewing the Davison Township millage which expires in August. The figures there are 59% in favor, 14% opposed, and 27% uncertain.
5. The City of Davison is clearly the hub of local commerce. However, residents say they do travel elsewhere for retail shopping and music & entertainment. A majority (54%) of our respondents would like to see more retail stores downtown, and nearly three-quarters (74%) would find more restaurants appealing. They also say that flowers & landscaping, benches, and building architecture are important to the downtown setting as well.

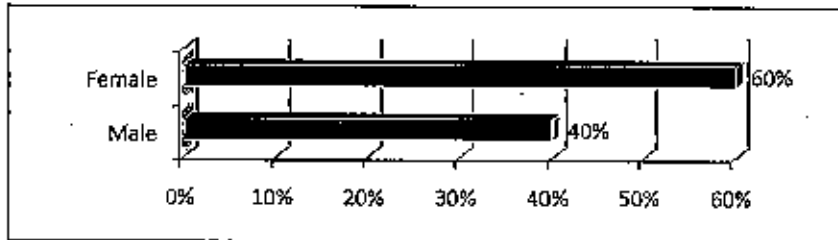

Respondents Correctly Identifying Their Place of Residence, by Political Unit

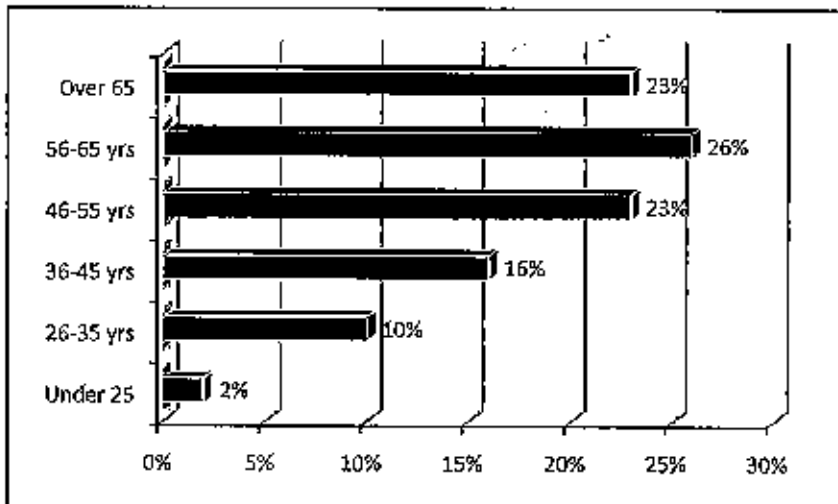

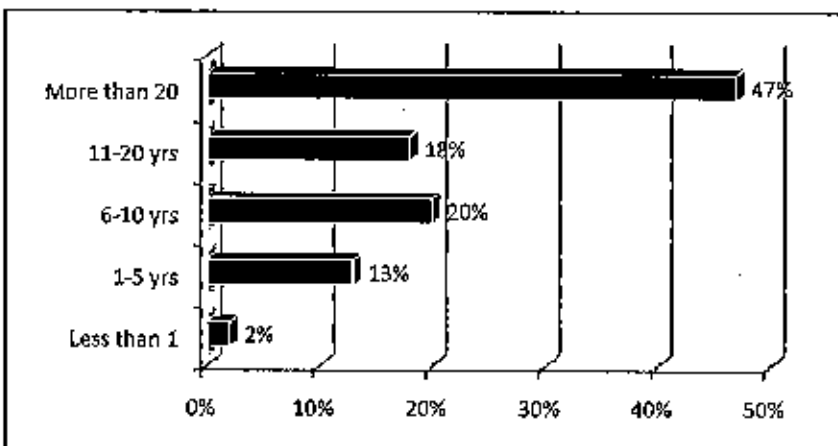
Sex (n=349)

Years of Residence (n=348)

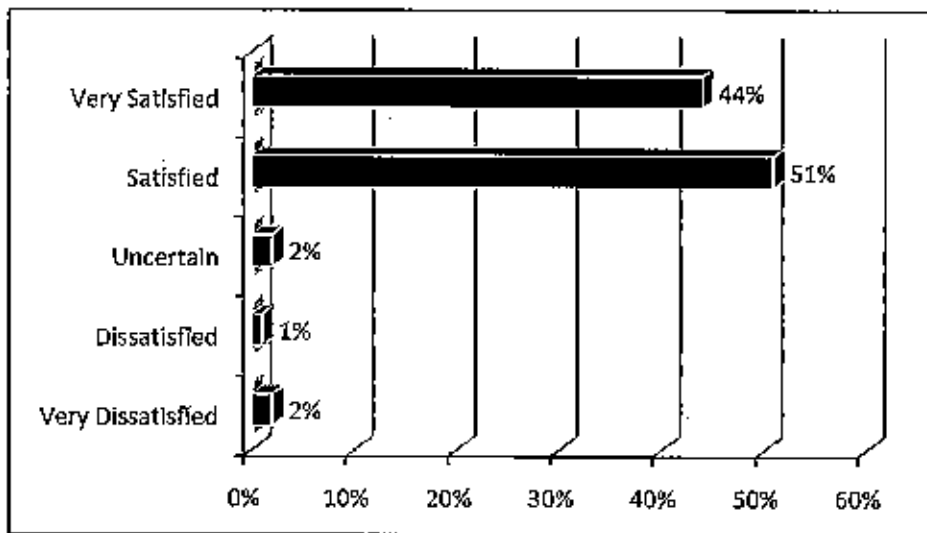

Section 1: General Satisfaction

- Satisfaction with the general quality of life is quite high: a combined 95% of respondents report themselves to be satisfied or very satisfied with the Davison-Richfield area as a place to live.
- Schools are a major source of pride: 54% call them excellent. At the other end of the scale, roads are rated as poor by 21% of those surveyed, and another 35% rate them as no better than adequate.
- There is substantial uncertainty about the Senior Center and the *Your Ride* program, even among persons at or approaching retirement age.
- Nearly ½ (48%) rate city or township government as open and accessible, and pluralities of comparable magnitude believe them to be effective and forward-looking. That only about 20% of residents place themselves on the negative ends of the Question 5 scales is notable in this continuing era of anti-government cynicism. However, our subjects exhibit substantial uncertainty here as well. For example, 49% of City residents don't know whether their government is wasteful or thrifty. 47% say the same in Davison Township, and likewise on the out-of-touch/in-touch continuum. One interpretation is that there is space for local officials to engage and educate residents appropriately.

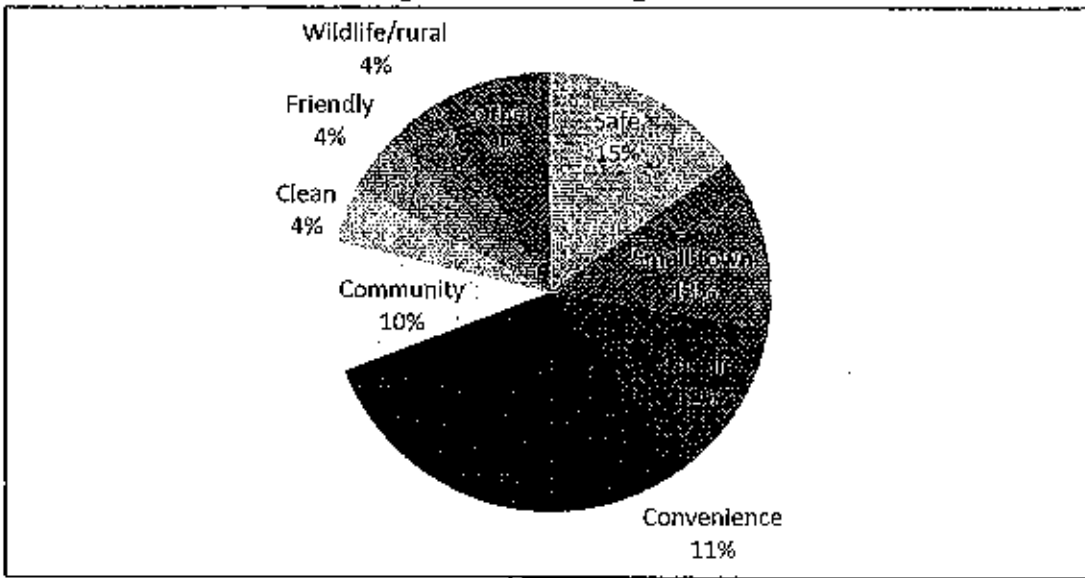
2. Overall, how would you rate the Davison-Richfield area as a place to live? (n=340)



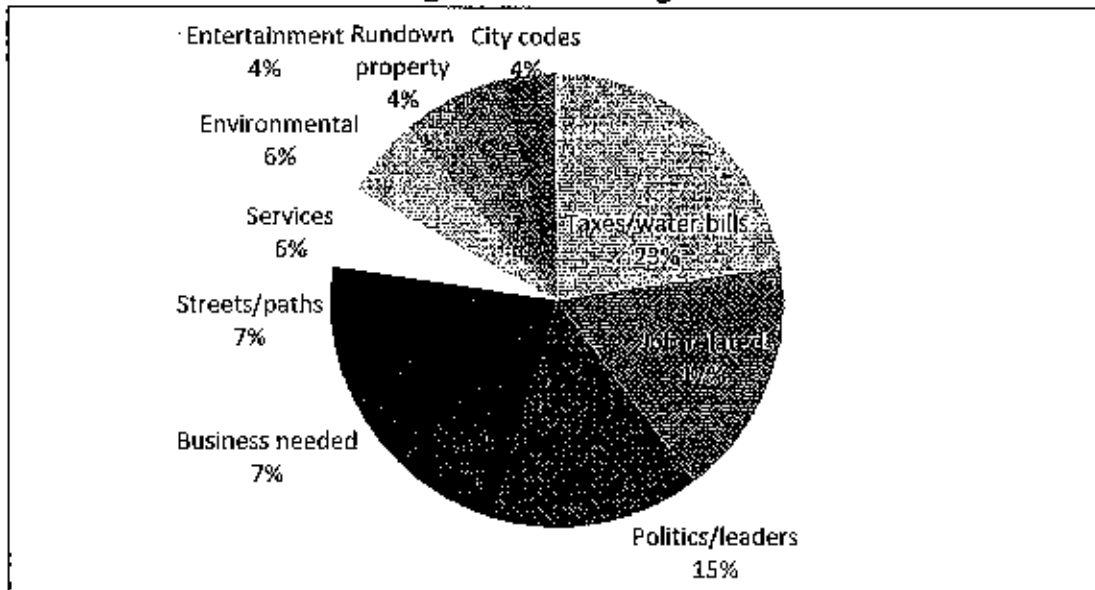

Best Things About Living in this Area

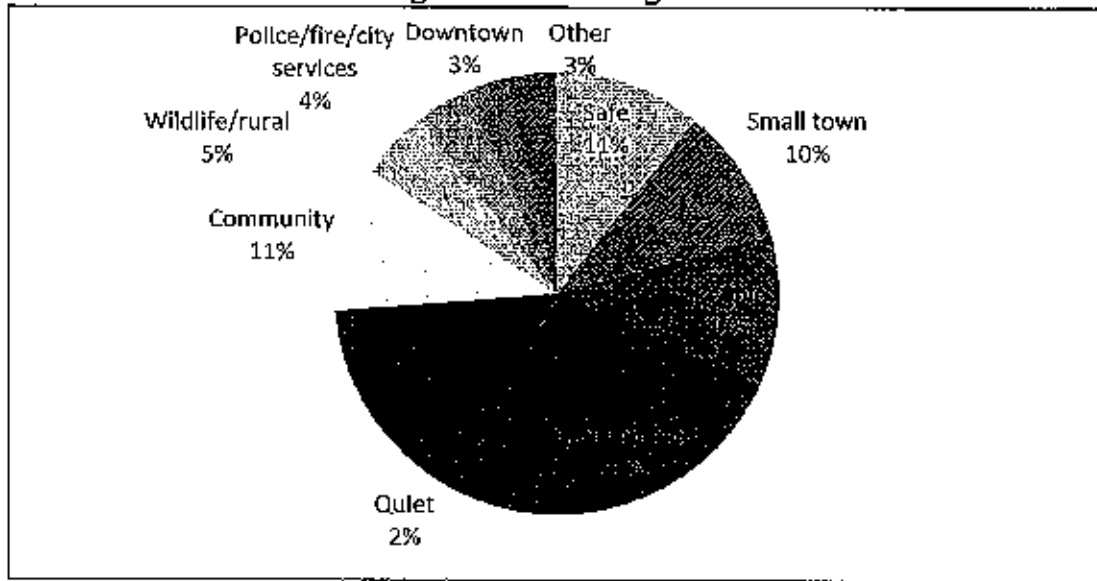


Worst Things About Living in this Area

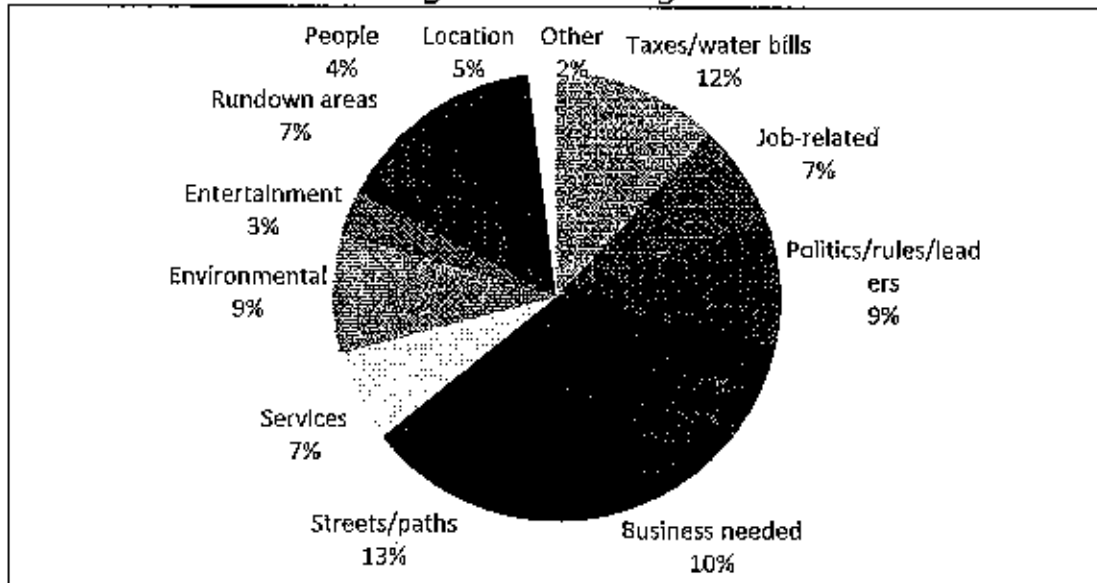


3. Best/Worst: Davison Township

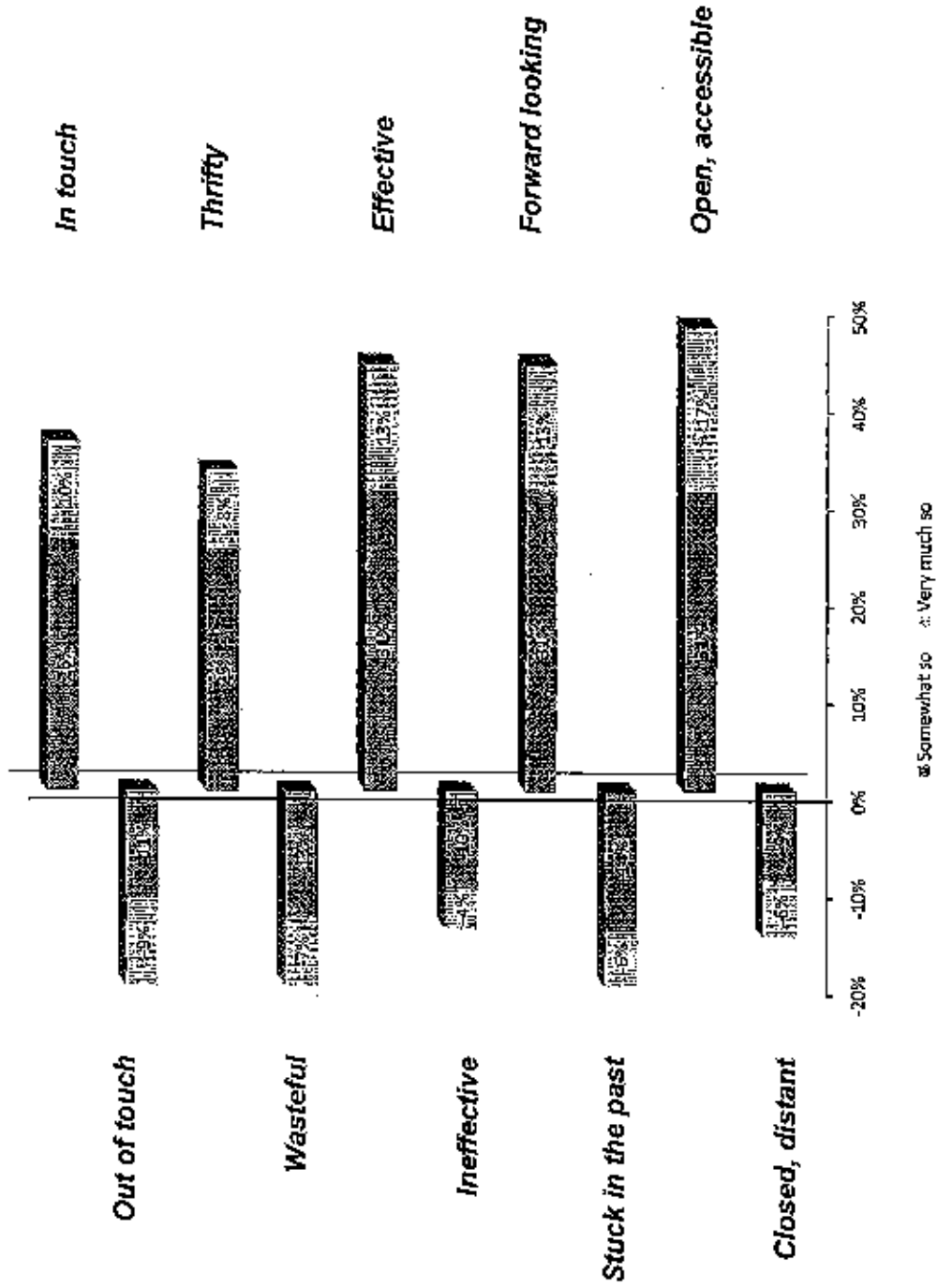

Section 2: More on Public Services

- A core purpose for this project is to gauge citizens' priorities in the face of retrenchment. 60% of voters are willing to reduce budget devoted to parks, trails, & recreation, and similar proportions say the same about community & economic development and building inspection & code enforcement. In contrast, 92% say that fire protection should be left alone; 84% say the same for police, and 81% for schools.
- Respondents are open to nearly all consolidation scenarios. Two-thirds say consolidation should be studied for city and township government in general. That pattern reverses for schools, however, and fewer than half (47%) are willing to have local officials study it for police protection.
- One-quarter of those responding indicate that some member of their household participated in a DCER activity during 2009. But satisfaction is very high among those who did: the combined very/satisfied rate is 91%.

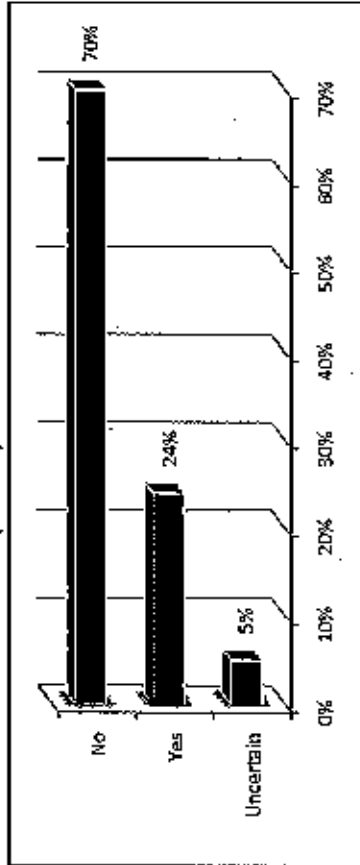

8. Did you or any member of your household participate in a DCER activity during the past year (2009)? (n=349)



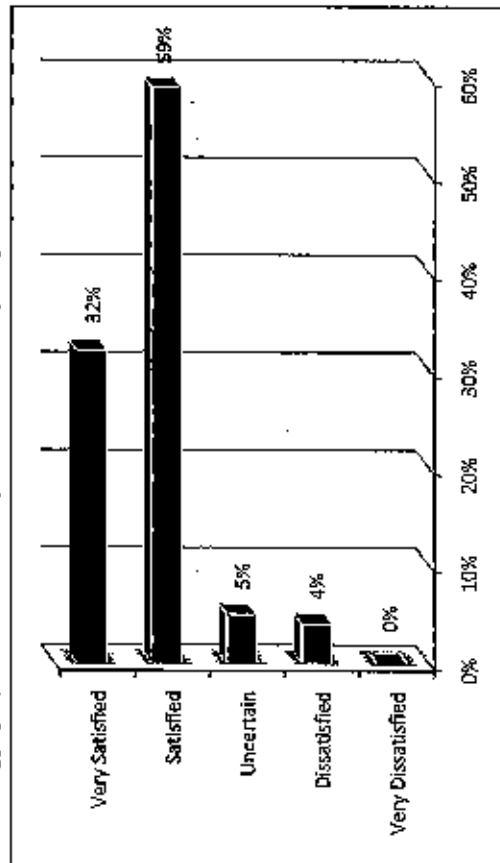

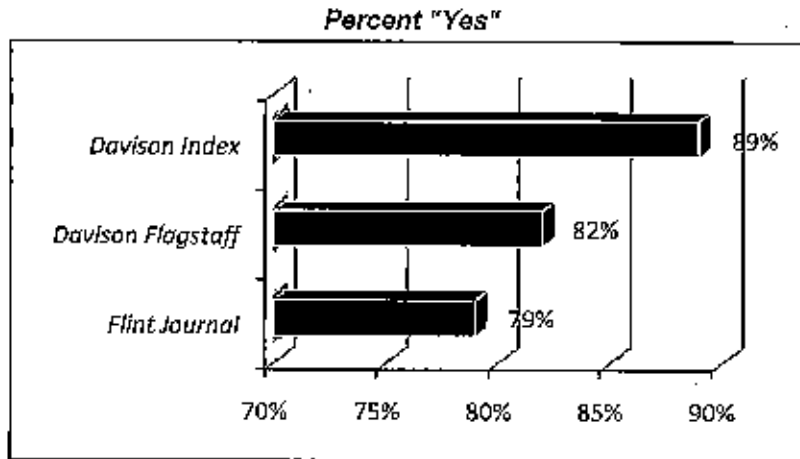
If Yes, how would you rate that program? (n=94)



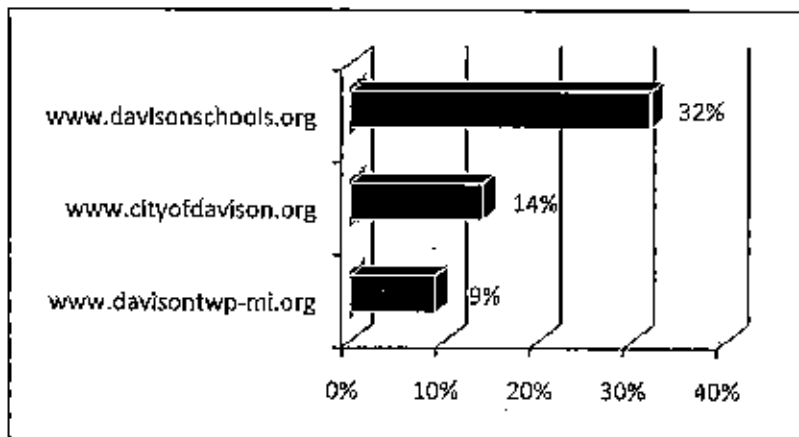
Section 3: Communications

- 69% recall having received a DCS newsletter and 55% say they watched DTV during the past year.

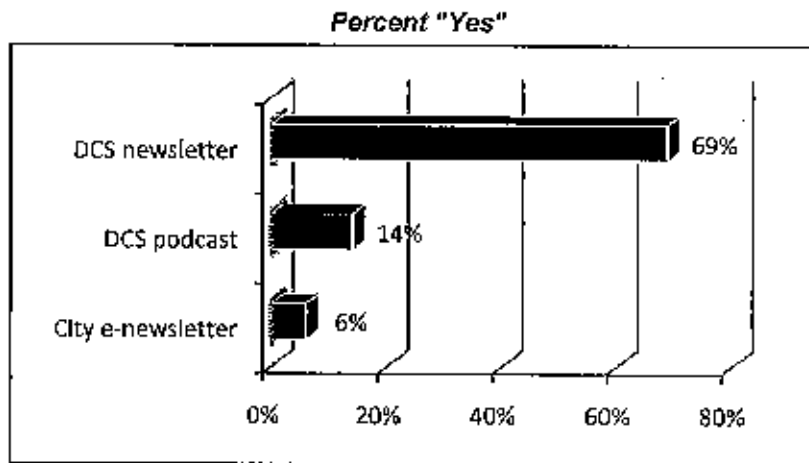
9. Have you read any of the following newspapers in the past month? (n=336)



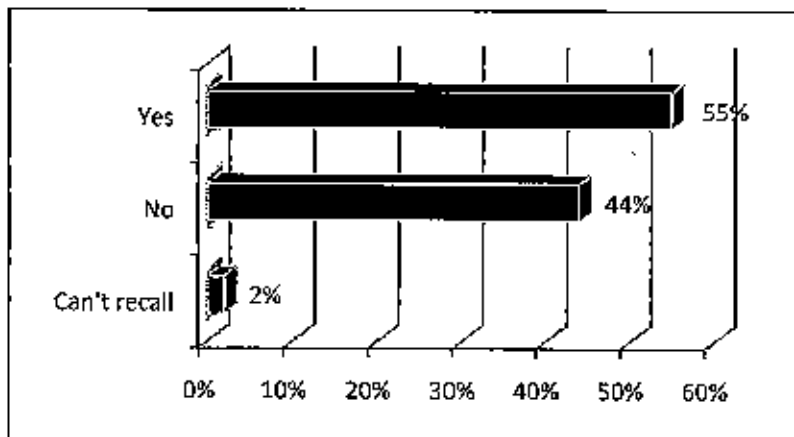
10. Have you visited any of the following websites in the past three months? (n=340)



11. Have you received any of the following during the past year? (n=339)



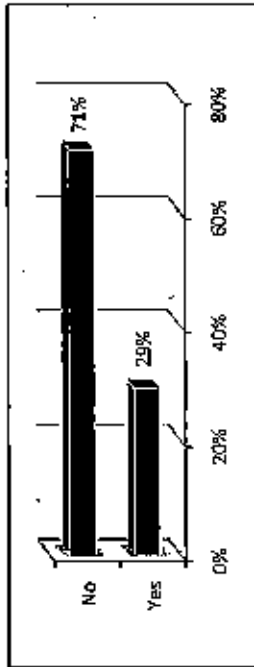
12. Have you watched DTV at any time during the past year? (n=350)



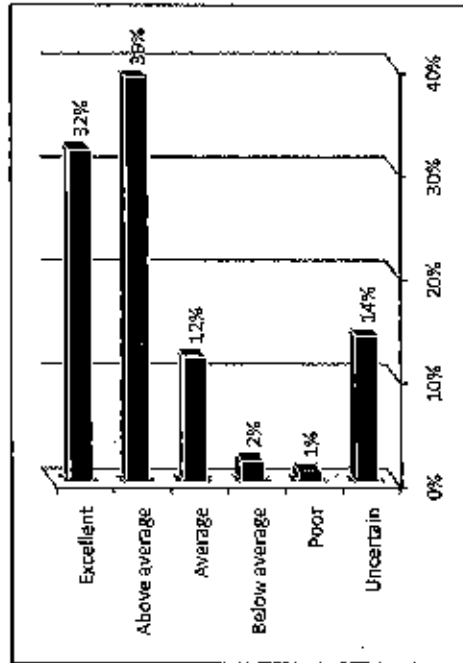
Section 4: Davison Community Schools

- A combined 71% rate the education provided by their schools as above average (39%) or excellent (32%). That figure is 83% among those persons with a school-age child in the household. As anticipated, perception increases with exposure: 45% of those having visited a school several times in the past two years rate the system as excellent; that figure is 19% among those who never have visited.
- A strong majority (59%) rate buildings and upkeep as better than the mean.
- Even so, respondents communicate significant uncertainty about their support for the upcoming millage renewals. While twice as many are in favor (43%) as are opposed (19%), that remaining 38% will need to be the focus of the efforts surrounding these ballot questions.

13. Do you currently have a school-age child living in your household? (n=357)

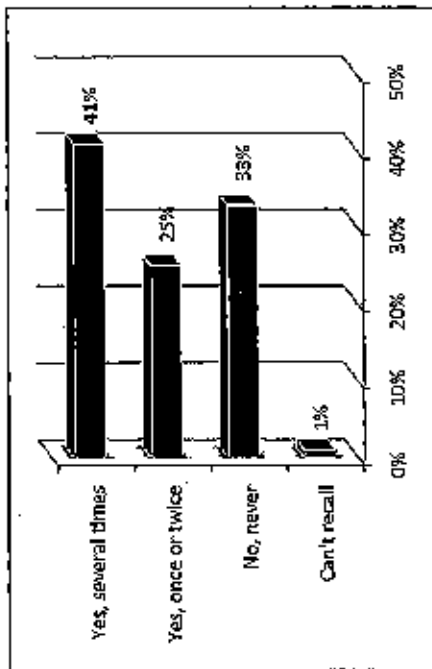


14. How would you rate the quality of education offered by the Davison Community Schools? (n=346)

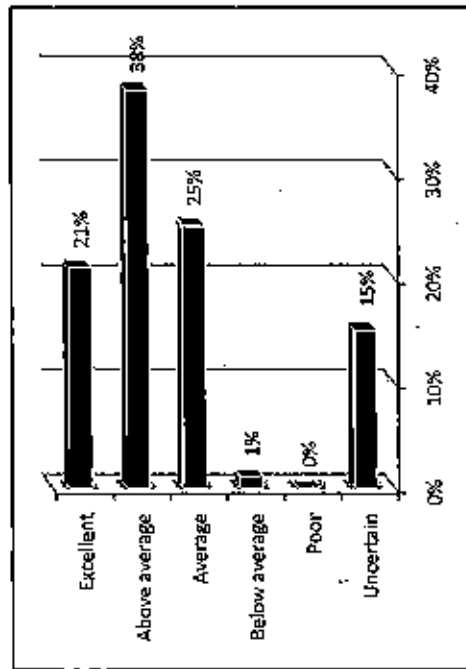

15. Have you had reason to visit one of the Davidson Community schools during the past two years? (n=351)

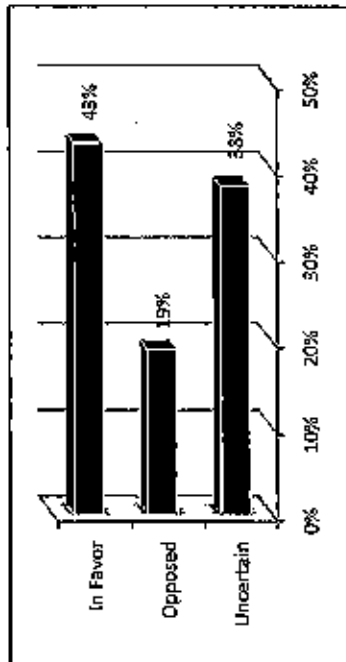


16. How would you rate the quality of buildings and upkeep offered by Davidson Community Schools? (n=342)

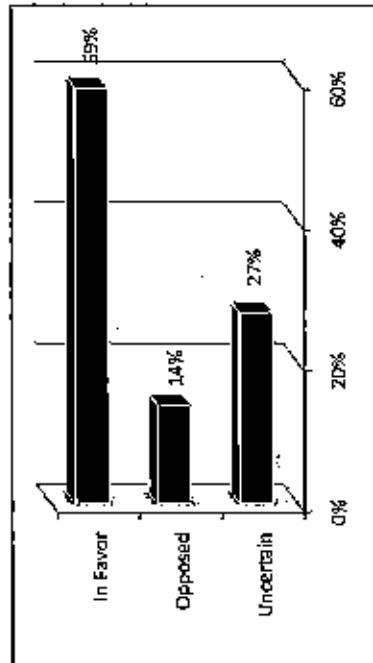

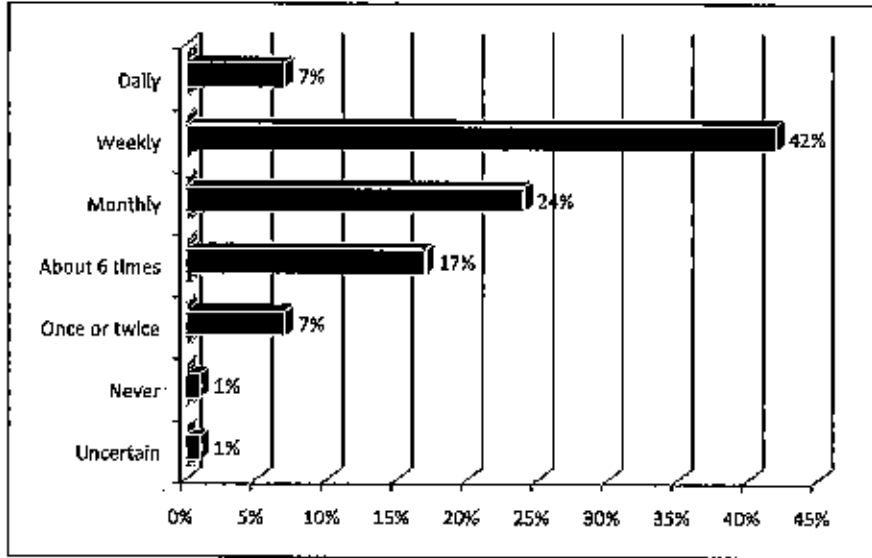
- The City of Davison is clearly the hub of local commerce, retail shopping and music/entertainment excepted.

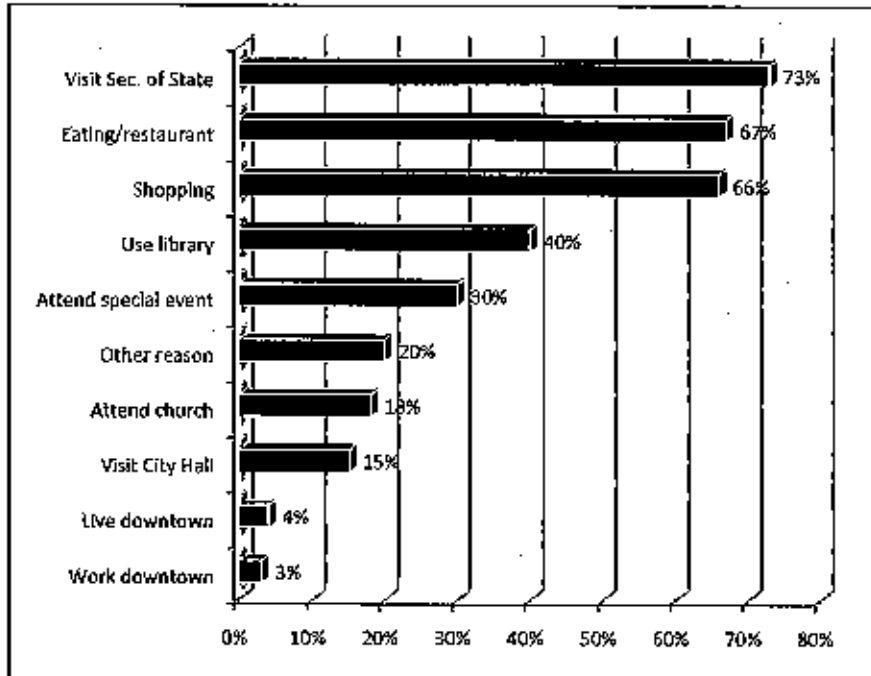

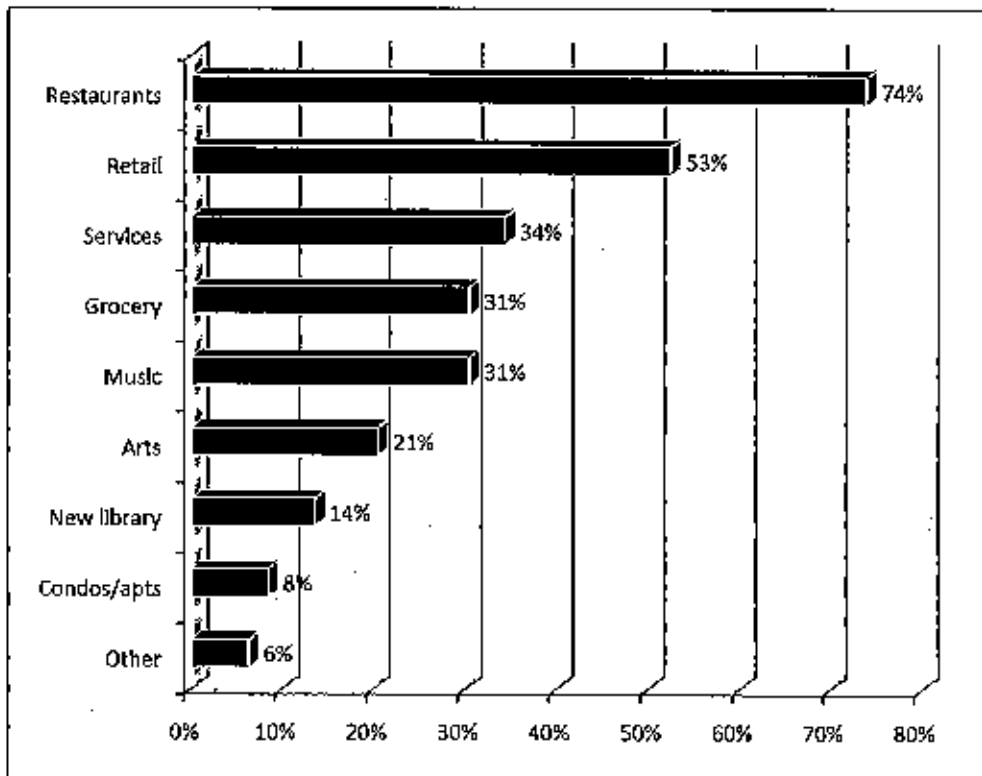
20. During the past year, how often would you say that you visited downtown Davison, on average? (n=349)



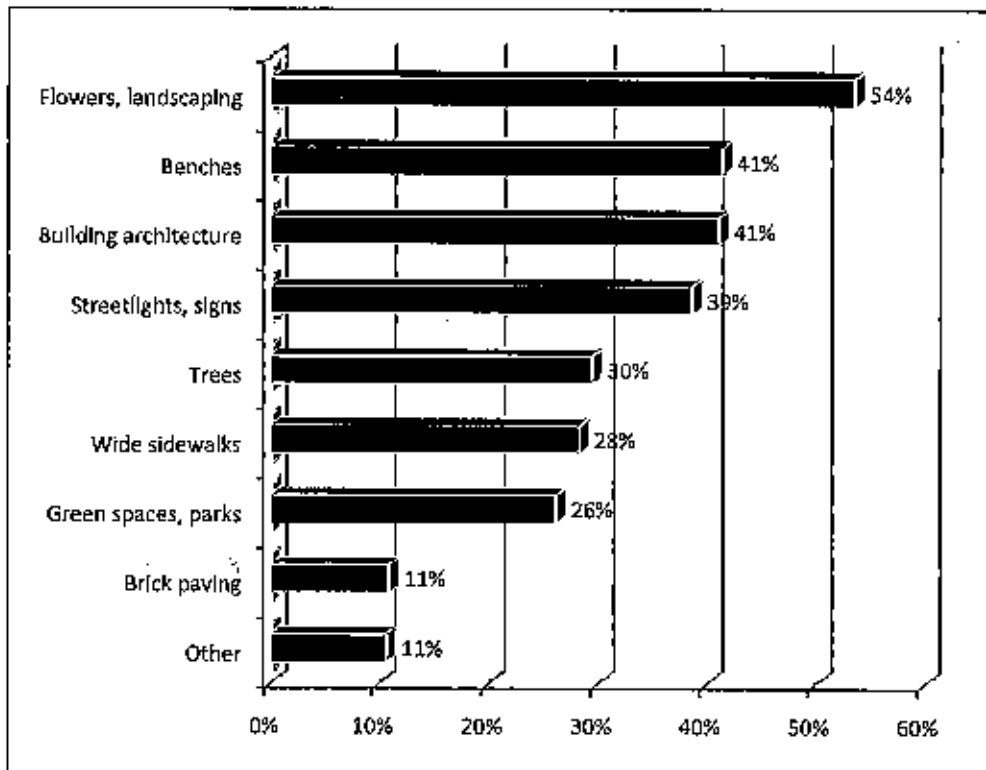
21. For what reason(s) did you visit? (n=322)



22. Which...of the following would you find most appealing in Davison's downtown corridor? (n=337)



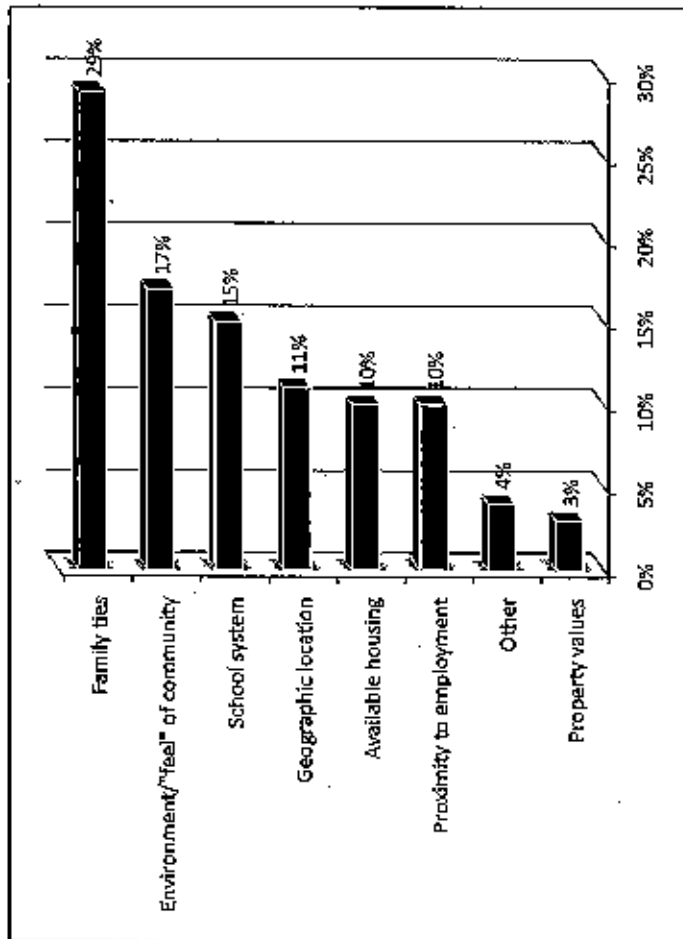
23. Which...of the following would you say are most important to such a setting? (n=328)



Section 7: Please Tell Us About Yourself

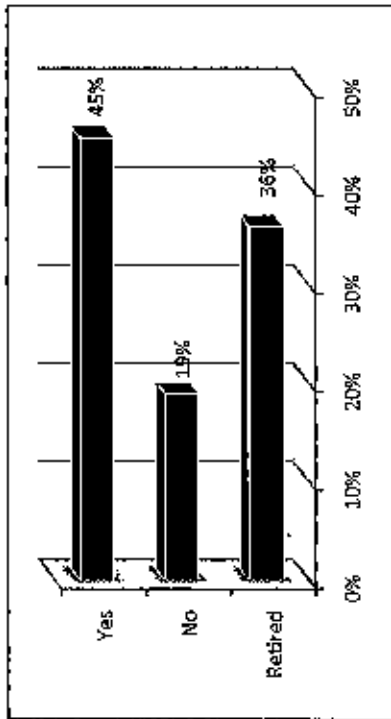
- Family ties of some sort are reported to be the most common reason for a person to live in the area. The environment or “feel” of the community as well as the schools round out the top three.
- 45% of respondents travel outside the area to work, while 19% work locally. 36% have retired. About one-third work within 10 miles (roundtrip); another third travels more than thirty miles each day.

27. What would you say was the most important reason that you decided to live here? (n=314)



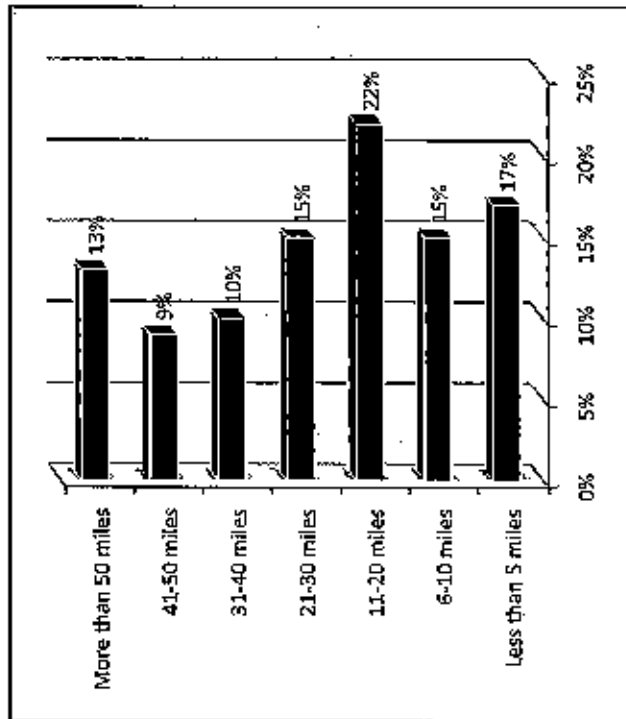

From City of Davison residents:

- I like Davison mostly because it is still a little-Big town. Meaning a country setting with the convenience of stores, etc. A lot of parks, trees, & activity for my children.
- I'm 92. Live in Collingwood Apartments. Swim at Country Club. Play cards at Senior Center. Eat at family restaurants. Very happy with Davison.
- I enjoy the City of Davison. I am very disappointed in council members who were not re-elected in the most recent election and their treatment and continued bad behavior to the mayor & new council. I am also unhappy with the city manager and I really felt we had to improve after the last one!
- Davison is a lovely place to live, shop or just "BE" in. I especially enjoy the peace & quiet that seems to be everywhere here. To be honest, the Davison area reminds me of life in Grand Blanc during the '70s & '80s when it was first growing. (I lived there from 1970-1995) & by the time my daughters were grown I could not wait to get away from there, as there were just TOO many people moving in. I sincerely hope Davison NEVER grows like that! Thank you.
- The 3 municipalities are constantly arguing amongst each other. Very poor public works service. City and township offices give a feeling of unwelcomeness. I was upset as well at my neighbors when I was forced to pay for a new football stadium. Other revenue options were there but not explored. We pay very high taxes and receive poor service. I am looking to move to another more friendly/resident-oriented city.
- I think the city needs to significantly cut spending, needs to also cut prop. taxes to match prop. values of current times. I went to the Bd of Review & they seemed more concerned about their revenue than the actual value of homes. We are all struggling – I've taken significant cuts at work, as have many others. I'd say to quit worrying about the "beauty" of downtown & worry about lowering taxes to get businesses in. Think more of your struggling citizens than your struggling budget. Police can be cut, as much as I normally would not support. What is up with the new Charger?? That's a disgrace & a slap in the face! I think you can raise mileage replacement & get a cheaper car – it may not be "cool" – but you would sure look better. I'm sure there's a lot more that's not visible to the public. It makes all spending questionable.
- Would really like an updated library. Would like continued support for schools. Want to live in a safe community. Thank you.
- Stop relying on government money to fund projects. It's the old carrot ploy, just out of reach. Council, work together or get out.
- All property taxes in the City of Davison need to be adjusted down – as all the values have fallen significantly & older families are struggling to keep up – while their income is on a downward spiral & with the state of the economy it will be difficult for anyone to vote to raise millage in any area.
- Do not like the push to make Davison look like other downtowns, i.e., Northville, Rochester or Frankenmuth. The original appeal was that it was small, comfy & old time. Canopies over sidewalks made it nice to walk downtown in the rain or snow. As they come down I go down there less & less. If I wanted a downtown like Rochester, etc. I would have moved there. If downtown is to grow it must grow to include M-15 as part of it & stop trying to get around it.

Put the rag canvas canopies on M-15. Be honest in government & not hide employee wages in the water bill. Leave it in general fund. If people do not want to pay for it cut it.

- Davison's elected leaders have for years tried to keep the area the "old farming community." If I look at Lapeer who's leadership has lead the city to a thriving community. They have great shopping, many restaurants, and a positive look to their sidewalk appeal. In Davison we have a great police department, a community fire authority, wonderful schools, but a dead downtown. A part of the failure to move forward can be seen in things like the 5 year battle over should the awnings come down or stay. They removed 1/2 of the awnings, new sidewalk, lighting. The other half is left untouched. This is typical of city council and DDA battling over who knows best. Last thing is the lack of people who are willing to serve on city council or school board.
- It's frustrating to have my property taxes climbing so much when the assessment on my home drops like a rock every year. I'm relatively certain I could not sell my home for what I still owe on it anymore. Yet my taxes keep shooting up. Perhaps I will vote down any millage renewals. I may have no choice.
- Davison is not a tourist trap, and will have a difficult time resembling attractive downtown areas of Rochester, Northville, and Frankenmuth. One reason is downtown, or getting to downtown Davison is not pedestrian friendly. Downtown does not have space to expand because M-15 is too close and is heavily traveled. The city code enforcement office needs to change. They are not consistent with how and what rules they enforce. This office also has multiple roles that conflict with today's modern living. Pertaining to vehicles, recreational and utility vehicles. How homeowners should manage yards, what buildings are acceptable and location on property. Bottom line – It is my property – I own it, I pay taxes on it. City council members are appointed officials, their salaries should be cut in half or not be paid at all. It's the only way to ensure that they will be true public servants and they stay in touch with the community.
- The rating of the governmental officials cannot improve until they are ready to listen to the people. All of the people. Not just the people who can afford changes that the city manager and some council people want. Davison has many citizens who are on a fixed income that are never taken into account. Listen to the needs and wants of the people – they know what they can afford.
- I love the feel of Davison – it has many interesting and unique spaces downtown, that you can see now that the DARK UGLY CANOPIES are down. I realize in tough times, it is hard to do anything more than what is absolutely necessary. I think there are plenty of volunteers for things if only they knew what opportunities were available. Could some projects be done by volunteers?
- Would really like to see the city manage the housing situation better & be more proactive in how they look. Also to see a huge improvement in our library to benefit everyone & to see city & township merge services (such as police, etc.).
- Need government (city council) people that know what they are doing & know government laws & regulations in general. Also people that get along & will agree on things. Ever since the new mayor was elected & now his handpicked "friends" on city council, the council is a joke. What one group wants the others are against. There seems to be constant disarray & disagreement. How can we run a government like that?

- Flint St. & M-15 intersection needs left turn signal. Having lived in Davison since 1962 & family within driving distance has kept me in town. I feel the downtown canopy over the sidewalk is very desirable – we should not have removed those that have been removed.
- Very ordinance-focused, no real focus on real & pressing needs of the area. City council is focused on passing ordinances about how many pets we can have and when we can take out our garbage while ignoring the city's financial situation. In the midst of a bad recession, they discuss drastically increasing the cost of water bills. The bickering needs to stop as well and council members need to behave in a professional manner.
- I think that to cut back in cost many of us have taken a large cut in our pay. Please keep the cost of living in Davison down so the people who like to live here can also afford to. Taxes, water!!
- I am all for the merger of the city with township.
- I have lived in Davison nearly my entire life. It saddens and frustrates me to see a city council that is so "divided" and lacking in vision for the future. In order for the community to flourish decades into the future it not only needs to retain its current residents but it also needs to appeal to new families. Why would a prospective family choose to move to Davison when cities like Fenton and Grand Blanc are equally convenient with many more amenities? Our excellent school system is no longer enough to set us apart from the others. Without future development, growth and change we are resigning ourselves to be an average community at best. What a waste of a great town.
- More attn to the appearance around town: cleaner crisper look not in the old downtown but the M-15 corridor.
- I love the Davison area & the services offered here. I believe that consolidation of services is a great way to save money & improve communication.
- I believe in consolidating city and township, but since it would raise township taxes I cannot see why they would approve such an action.
- Make this survey easier to read and understand for me. Thank you.
- Releasing the Public Works Director and nobody really in charge. City council that seems to spend more time arguing over an issue than solving the problem.
- Current elected officials are embarrassing to the community. Voting on issues they have obviously not researched lacks intelligence & integrity. It is obvious the current new council members are not informed on issues and vote self-servingly. In my many years of living in the City of Davison never have I recalled having a group of elected officials act so stupid. It is downright frightening!

From Davison Township residents:

- Davison is a great location for retired people, that is why we live here.
- Losing the rural & old town setting – this is not Rochester or Bloomfield! Don't like direction Twp officials are taking.

- The Township and City should become 1. The community should not try to be something it will never be. Mid-Michigan population is not going to grow much in the near future. Proposed boulevard is not needed. Money could be used on road repairs.
- I believe that it is time to consolidate the three communities. This allows the Davison community to grow as one, instead of competing against each other. Units of government will be reduced along with fire & police departments. Hopefully taxes could be lowered, making it more attractive for others to relocate to our community, including new business.
- Overall I am satisfied with life in Davison. The areas that really need improvement are: road conditions (potholes and general disrepair), snowplowing (more affluent subdivisions get cleared before lower income areas). Government for both City and Township are overstaffed in many areas and overpaid (both in pay and benefits packages) and the school board needs to become more in touch with the community. The school board and upper administration are overpaid both in salary and benefits. Cuts need to be made there before they start cutting teacher pay and supplies. Also frivolous things like million dollar stadiums that are poorly constructed & barely used need to be cut out as long as the economy is down.
- I'm very happy to live in Davison. Good job.
- Our community seems to be divided between the older people that want everything to stay the same and younger people that want to advance to the future which is creating a hard time to get anything done. Such as the canopy removal that only partially got completed. This happens often which I feel creates an inefficient government and a waste of taxpayers' money.

- I really don't know the (City of) Davison. I think that downtown is beautiful & some of the stores are essential to draw people in. The addition to Salvation Army was great! With the economy & the fact that a lot of people living in Davison or Twp. are living paycheck to paycheck – unfortunately save less! The grocery (Kroger - 1), Ace Hardware, Library, Sec. of State, etc. – (VG's - 2) – are essential! I wish that the Library had more self-help books, especially faith-based! God bless.
- The town or township needs a rec center like Lapeer's, pool, exercise, etc. – something to do, there is little to do here besides eat – too fat! [drawing/self-portrait provided].
- This county is a microcosm of the State of Michigan as a whole. I moved up to this area, from the Detroit area, where I was born and raised, for many reasons. To escape crime, the hustle & bustle, and to live in the country, to name a few. Raising taxes has been proven thousands of times to hurt the economy and the state in general. - Would like more restaurants, delis, maybe a Cracker Barrel.

I think we need a revolution! Screw the lobbyist. And the police should start going after real criminals instead of small crime with easy arrests and fines for big money in our society. except this. This would help very much. We have lived in the Twp since 2001, and consider this our "adopted" area to enjoy our retirement years, except winter months.

- I think that there should be a study on the procedures/rules for the schools. Mostly on discipline & parking areas, etc. The rules of all citizens of Davison. Teachers & staff alike. Procedures & rules, etc. are doing more harm than good for our high school and alternative ed. students.
- City or Twp are run by certain families and friends, that if you are not in this group you are an outsider. Football is overbudgeted, money is filtered into certain businesses that are owned by the "family." Growth is shot down unless owned by the families. Meijer is small and was limited by City/Twp.
- Totally dissatisfied with Twp police. Response time unacceptable – especially with alarm systems. Wouldn't vote for any extras.
- Frankly, I think the biggest obstacle to downtown development is the route of M-15. In Vassar and Millington, M-15 is downtown. Davison's downtown is a block off the highway. There's currently no draw from State Road.

- I am thankful to have Larson's Ace downtown – they are so helpful when I have a question. Also appreciate the Sec. of State office so close (walk). I use the Black Creek Trail 3-5 times/week – It's great! I do wish there were bike paths in this area – I would enjoy riding them (safer than the roads).
- The people of Davison are friendly & warm. The school system is excellent and responds to the needs of its students. There are some outstanding teachers. The city has many activities for kids so that they can get a hometown feeling – parades, musical programs, lots of sports, etc. They are developing a very nice park system. Downtown is looking better. I didn't mind the porches over the sidewalks but I must admit they look much better without them. (Of course they were designed to look like shops sitting in the cheaper part of Chicago under the EL. They could have had a better design). The police in the past were known for their brutality toward youth. I don't know if this is true now, but they should be taught to behave professionally towards all citizens. On my minor calls they have responded well. We have been very happy in Davison. One son lives here now, and the other two would like to return.
- I like the canopies. We love the walking trails. It's been a great place to raise a family, great educational system, friendly people. We plan to retire here.

- Davison is a great community to live in. The churches are numerous and congregations are friendly. We attend Davison Free Methodist where Pastor Brad Burton is a great influence and leader. We've been impressed by the schools and staff. The Davison community has a small town atmosphere with friendly people, great restaurants and banks, credit unions and grocery stores.
- Some of my answers are not fair because I have spent the last three months in Florida. We are snowbirds and spend almost six months in FL. I have had five children, 2 stepchildren and 2 grandchildren go through the Davison school system and consider it an excellent school system.

Oh, and the football field should have never been built; that money could have been put to something much more useful. This is a concerned parent and citizen in the City of Davison, and I hope this is actually looked at.
- Left turn arrow needed at M-21 & M-15. I loved raising my family in this community.
- I feel sorry for Jimmy's Café and White Panda. I enjoy them but cannot find parking (not even handicap) when judo place has classes. I am glad they are doing good but want to park close to the restaurants. #7 consolidation should be studied, or at least look into. This does not mean we must consolidate, or should consolidate.
- We need a dog park. I no longer feel safe at Richfield Park like I did when I was a kid. I'm afraid to go there to walk my dog by myself. Very tired of being taxed. I like recycling.
- The roads really need help!
- 1. Put in map of area discussed. For the shopping Qs: Is there even a full grocery store in the City of Davison? I thought Davison-Flint Rd. was the boundary which makes VGs and Kroger north of the city and in Richfield. 2. For the police millage – does not renewing it mean no police or only reduced? Could less costly person take reports of stolen merchandise or other non-direct?

- I like it here, moved here in 1972. Raised family and have no desire to leave because it changes little. I don't like change, especially rapid change.
- Richfield Rd has no natural gas on a short distance between State Rd and Oak. About 5 or 6 houses have it east of State Rd. The rest of the people to Oak Rd don't have it; gas starts at Oak and goes east. The cost of propane is very expensive & costly.
